My granddaddy moved from there to Lynnville and from Lynnville he moved to where Louise Scott lives. He rented that house here in Elkton, and then after about a couple of years he bought the farm that I grew up on, after we moved here when I was about seven, well about six years old. I guess I was probably about nine when we moved in the house on the farm that my granddaddy had bought. I lived there then until I got married when I was seventeen. And I've lived the rest of my life within a three mile radius of where I grew up. . . I don't remember a lot, what the town looked like, because we did not get to go very much. We had a car, but we worked all the time. Daddy was a farmer, he worked all day long in the field and he would milk cows and we just didn't go a lot. So I don't really remember when I moved here, exactly what the town looked like.

Ann Smith: Life on the Farm

Daddy rented most of the land and he worked when he was raising cotton and corn. When we moved in the first house that we lived in in Elkton, I remember picking cotton, but he didn't have a tractor at that time. So I'm sure that he planted a field of cotton with horses.

ECS: Probably mules or horses.

AS: Or mules, yes. But our, I do remember picking cotton there and I remember catching the school bus. I remember our little dog getting on the school bus. He thought he was going to school with us. [laughter] I remember shucking corn and shelling corn for the chickens. We shelled, we had a garden; we shelled beans, and broke beans, and shucked corn. . . We lived off of fresh vegetables in the summer time. And my mother would can enough that we ate off of them all winter. We shelled dried beans and we. . Daddy took corn and took it to a mill and had it ground. About the only things we bought was flour and sugar and coffee and tea.
